Manuscripts should be typed on A4 paper in Times New Roman, font size 12, and be 6000–8000 words in length, including references and appendices. Each submission must include a 150–200-word abstract and five keywords. The author's full details should appear on the first page only, and pages must be numbered consecutively.
